Foreword

It appears that Canada's relatively young profession of landscape architecture has had little time and opportunity to reflect on itself and attempt to record its own heritage and history, neither on the national, nor on the regional or provincial level. However, the longer we wait, the more details of the early history will be lost and the fewer of the earlier practitioners will be there to contribute their experiences.

Several partial historical accounts exist, most notably Frances V. Blue's CSLA History completed in 1970, as well as numerous magazine articles describing certain aspects of the Society and the profession's activities over the years. "Glimpses of CSLA/AAPC History" is just one more partial effort, trying to 'freeze in time' events, activities and information we were able to discover and record before they may be lost permanently. We hope this information will be useful when, eventually, a complete and comprehensive history of CSLA/AAPC and the profession will be researched and written.

The primary source of information on the Society are the CSLA/AAPC records, which were originally housed in the McLaughlin Library Archives at the University of Guelph, together with the Dunington-Grubb Collection (which is still there). However, during the 1984 Jubilee Congress the CSLA/AAPC Board of Governors decided to move the material to the National Archives in Ottawa. An inventory exists of 35 boxes which found their way to the National Archives in November 1985. There, the material is certainly safe, but little was realized at the time how costly and time consuming it is to access this information. In 1994 we were able to retrieve a small amount of the stored material, in order to complete some urgently needed information on the College of Fellows. This was also of assistance for extracting other information contained in this brochure. Eventually, copies of all these records will have to be obtained from the National Archives in order to enable someone to research and prepare the complete history of CSLA/AAPC.

In the meantime, we hope that "Glimpses of CSLA/AAPC History" will be helpful in providing some of the previously unknown information and statistics. May it also serve as a reminder of our heritage and the efforts of pioneers who laid the foundation on which we build today and, most of all, may it serve as incentive for renewed efforts to research and write the complete history of our profession in Canada.

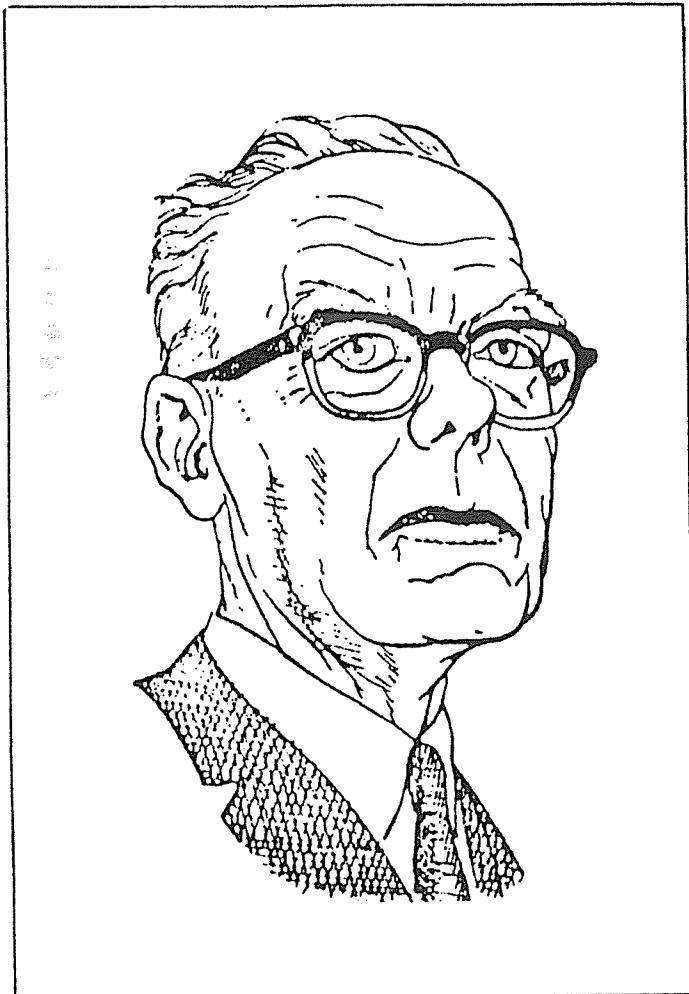

Membership

It appears that the number of CSLA/AAPC members was never well recorded and even today it is difficult to obtain an accurate count of members from the Society's office.

The late Frances V. Blue recorded in her 1970 CSLA History the following: "Until 1959 new members were admitted in very small numbers each year, but that year we were lucky in being able to admit a record number and that record has been beaten several times in the 1960s. In 1962, the entire roster was double that of a decade earlier; in 1967, the roster was double that of 1962."

From CSLA/AAPC Board of Governors minutes we were able to extract the following membership numbers:

Membership Dues

Early records indicate that during the 1940s, the 1950s and in 1960 the CSLA fees for members in Central Canada amounted to \$25.00 and for members "at a great distance" and associates \$12.50. In 1961 the fees were raised to \$40.00 for members and \$25.00 for associates. A further increase occurred in 1966, when members' dues became \$50.00 and associates' dues \$30.00. In more recent years the following fee rates applied:

The College of Fellows

Election to Fellow is the highest honour the CSLA/AAPC bestows on its members. Fellowship is the recognition of members who have made an outstanding contribution to the profession over an extended period of time.

The first Fellows were elected in 1964, followed by almost annual additions averaging three Fellows per year. By 1979, over 30 members had been honoured by election to Fellowship and it was time to formalize the structure and process. At CSLA/AAPC Congress '79 in Charlottetown, the 'College of Fellows' was established. Specific 'Rules for the Conduct of Operations' were adopted, outlining the structure and operation of the College and the guidelines for advancement of members to Fellowship.

The College's Executive Committee is responsible for the conduct of affairs, consisting of the Chair, Vice Chair, Secretary-Treasurer, one representative of each the Accreditation Council and the Landscape Architecture Canada Foundation (LACF), as well as the CSLA/AAPC President as ex-officio member. The Annual Meeting of the College is held each year in conjunction with the CSLA/AAPC Congress. An average of 20 Fellows have attended each AGM over the last several years.

Particular attention has been given to the manner in which new Fellows are admitted to the College and the role of the College in the larger activities of the profession and the Society. In accordance with the Rules for the Conduct of Operations, nominations to Fellowship may be presented to the College by the component organizations and/or the Board of Governors of CSLA/AAPC. The final selection is made by a 'Jury of Fellows', consisting of representatives from Canada's five regions (B.C., Prairie, Ontario, Quebec and Atlantic), who are serving on the Jury for overlapping three-year terms. The Fellows-Elect are then ceremoniously inducted into the College during the banquet of the next CSLA/AAPC Congress.

Other activities of the College and its members are the operation of the Accreditation Council, which administers the accreditation of Canadian schools/departments of landscape architecture since 1987, as well as the LACF. Since the 'Campaign of Fellows' commenced in 1988, over \$75,000 have been donated by Fellows to the Foundation. These funds are used to promote the ideals of the profession of landscape architecture through research and scholarship grants.

In recent years a special effort has been made to establish a profile record on each Fellow, in order to have such information available for present and future generations of landscape architects. To date, these records are on file for 63% of Fellows.

Since the inception of CSLA/AAPC, a total of 88 Fellows have been elected, 14 of whom are now deceased. The following two pages present listings of Fellows in alphabetical order (Register of Fellows) and by year of investiture. Following are other listings of College Chairs, Secretary-Treasurers, Juries of Fellows and of those individuals who have obtained Fellowship in both CSLA and ASLA.

The Landscape Architecture Canada Foundation

The Foundation was originally incorporated as a charitable organization by the Minister of Consumer and Corporate Affairs on July 28, 1978 under the name "The Canadian Society of Landscape Architects Foundation / La Fondation de L'Association des Architectes Paysagistes du Canada" (CSLAF).

The formation of the Foundation was announced by its first President, Donald W. Graham, FCSLA at the CSLA/AAPC Congress '78 in Winnipeg (Aug.10-12/78) and the following Fellows were appointed as the original Board of Directors:

The objectives of the CSLAF were:

- to solicit and receive funds, expend gifts, grants and legacies;
- to provide scholarships and fellowships in the curricula of landscape architecture;
- to prepare and disseminate educational material;
- to assist educational and scientific projects; and
- to confer and grant awards.

As little progress was made in the early years, a task force under the chairmanship of Cecelia Paine, FCSLA, was established in March 1987 to clearly define the organizational structure and activities of the Foundation. The task force presented its comprehensive report in August 1987, which provided the basis for the Foundation's operation as it exists today.

In the following year the Foundation was renamed as the "Landscape Architecture Canada Foundation/ D'Architecture de Paysage du Canada" (LACF). The name change was registered with the Minister of Consumer and Corporate Affairs on February 26, 1988.

Also in 1988, James R. Taylor, FCSLA became President of the Foundation and Cecelia Paine, FCSLA took on the responsibilities as its Secretary. A philosophical framework was established for LACF, as well as the following goal: "The objective of the Landscape Architecture Canada Foundation is to promote the ideals of the profession of landscape architecture through research, communication and scholarship. To achieve this objective, LACF solicits, receives and manages gifts, grants and legacies; sets policies and establishes program priorities; and reviews, funds and communicates its activities and programs".

LACF received a generous donation of \$10,000 from the Ontario Association of Landscape Architects in 1988

which provided the start-up fund for new activities. At CSLA/AAPC Congress '88 in Winnipeg, Douglas D. Paterson, FCSLA, Chair of the College of Fellows, initiated the 'Campaign of Fellows' with the goal of raising \$50,000 through donations from Fellows over the next five years. Although this target was not quite met, the College of Fellows approved an open-ended extension to the Campaign of Fellows at CSLA/AAPC Congress '93 in Montreal and by mid-1996 over \$77,000 had been contributed. The current assets of the Foundation amount to approximately \$80,000.

By 1990, a Grants Committee was established, chaired by Cecelia Paine, FCSLA and clear guidelines for the submission and evaluation of grant applications were adopted. Between 1990 and 1995, thirteen grants were approved totalling almost \$20,000.

A new Fund Raising Strategy "LACF 2000" was developed by the LACF Strategic Planning Committee (Vincent Asselin, Doug Clark, James Taylor and Don Vaughan) in November 1994, with a campaign target of \$500,000. Its first phase is expected to be launched at CSLA/AAPC Congress '97 in Edmonton.

LACF's Philosophical Framework

The primary goal of the Landscape Architecture Canada Foundation is to support the protection and enhancement of the environment for the betterment of humankind. To achieve this goal, LACF supports the ideals commonly expressed through the profession of landscape architecture. These ideals include but are not limited to:

- conserving and managing environmental resources;
- understanding and accommodating the interrelationship of people and the environment;
- enhancing and improving aesthetic quality in the environment.

Glimpses of CSLA/AAPC History The Accreditation Council

The Canadian Society of Landscape Architects had developed an accreditation policy in form of a 16-page brochure as early as 1979, when accreditation of schools of landscape architecture at Canadian universities was provided exclusively by ASLA's Landscape Architecture Accreditation Board (LAAB).

At CSLA/AAPC Congress '85 in Saskatoon (July 4-6), Bradley R. Johnson, FCSLA was appointed the first Chair of the CSLA/AAPC Accreditation Council and given the task of establishing the Council and accreditation program. In October 1985, the "Manual of Accreditation Standards and Procedures" (24 pages) was prepared and by May 1986, five Fellows and two lay persons had confirmed their membership on the Council. The first meeting was conducted on June 6, 1986 in Ottawa with Peter Jacobs, Brad Johnson, Don Pettit and Jim Stansbury in attendance and Doug Paterson present via telephone.

It was established that the Council would have five members, including the chair, consisting of at least three Fellows, one landscape architecture educator/administrator who may or may not be a Fellow, and one non landscape architect lay member, each serving a three year term. The visiting team would consist of three members, appointed by Council from a roster provided jointly by the schools and CSLA component organizations. The Manual of Standards and Procedures was up-dated in October 1986 and January 1989.

While the Accreditation Council provided the College of Fellows with reports of its activities and the College provided the Council with personnel from its membership, the primary reporting relationship for the Council has always been directly with the CSLA/AAPC Board of Governors (BoG), which had to consider all accreditation reports for final approval.

The first Accreditation Team visit took place on November 23-24, 1987 at the University of Manitoba and accreditation of its program was approved in March 1988. This was followed by visits to the University of Toronto (in conjunction with the LAAB) on March 19-22, 1989 and the Université de Montreal on April 3-5, 1989. The second Accreditation Team visit to the University of Manitoba occurred on February 4-5, 1994 and to the University of Toronto on February 27 - March 2, 1994, again coinciding with an accreditation visit by LAAB. The University of British Columbia had its first accreditation visit in February 1996.

Since 1993, CSLA and ASLA have been discussing a joint policy on accreditation visits. This has resulted in the signing of a memorandum of understanding at the June 8-9, 1996 CSLA/AAPC Board of Governors meeting in Regina, stating that: "The members of the ASLA Board of Trustees and the CSLA Board of Governors have adopted policies recognizing the quality of each organization's accrediting body to be comparable."

Specifically, the agreement recognizes that the geographic scope of the CSLA Landscape Architects Accreditation Council is Canada and its territories. CSLA and ASLA will each include the other's accredited programs in their published annual lists of accredited schools.

At least once every five years the accreditation standards and procedures of each accrediting body will be reviewed to compare the accreditation processes applied in the USA and Canada, and to reaffirm the reciprocal relationship. The accreditation bodies will also meet periodically to discuss educational values. Observers from one accrediting body will accompany visiting teams of the other from time to time. Training of site visitors, which is conducted by one accrediting body will be open to site visitors from the other accrediting body.

The benefits of the accreditation agreement are in maintaining high academic quality, improving the visibility of Canadian programs and in improving efficiency and cost effectiveness. Formally, accreditation of Canadian landscape architecture programs was somewhat varied: the University of Guelph's undergraduate and graduate programs were accredited by the ASLA; the University of Toronto's undergraduate program by both the ASLA and CSLA, and other programs at UBC, Université de Montreal and University of Manitoba, by CSLA. The agreement smooths access to graduate schools in the USA for Canadian students and access to Canadian schools for American students. Accreditation standards and training of visiting teams will be upgraded. The ability for professional landscape architects to move freely between Canada and the USA will also be improved.

Implementation of the accreditation agreement in Canada was furthered by an agreement between the Canadian Council of Landscape Architectural Educators (CCLAE) representatives and the Board of Governors that CSLA/AAPC will support a more independent and stronger Accreditation Council. It will in future make autonomous decisions and advise the BoG, rather than simply making recommendations to the BoG. CSLA/AAPC has also committed to providing administrative support to the Council. Better continuity will be built into the system: the members of the new Accreditation Council will have a longer, five-year term with a chair elected for three years.

Visiting teams will continue to consist of a practicing landscape architect, a landscape architectural educator and an administrator. All visiting teams will be free of any conflict of interest. They will be well trained and from different geographical areas. Practitioners will have a diversity of experience. At least two members of a team visiting a French language program, including the chair, will be completely bilingual and the team's report will be in French.

One of the five Canadian schools will be accredited each year. In order to enlarge the pool of potential visiting team members, each team will in future include a landscape architect from another country, likely the United States, since this will be coordinated with the ASLA's LAAB. ASLA has generously offered to train CSLA members as accreditors on the basis of two or three people per year. The cost of training would be nominal. In order to fund the accreditation process the schools and CSLA agreed to contribute matching funds of approximately \$5,000 to \$6,000 per year.

The Professional Awards Program

It is unclear when Canadian landscape architects competed for the first time among themselves for design awards. In researching the Minutes of CSLA Board of Governors meetings, the first indication appears in 1969. It mentions that at the October Annual Meeting in Ottawa, 3 Awards of Excellence and 4 Awards of Merit were presented. The committee that organized this "Design Competition" consisted of Norman P. Fodchuck (Chair), Donald W. Pettit, FCSLA and Henry Stengel, while the jury was made up of Otis Bishopric, FCSLA and Roderick Clack.

It appears that regional Awards Programs began to emerge in the early 1980s. Records indicate that OALA conducted a Professional Awards Program in 1982 under the chairmanship of Terry M. Findlay. The first CSLA brochure we were able to find refers to the 1983 "Professional Awards Programme", indicating that the event was hosted by AALA and entries were to be submitted to the AALA President, with presentation of awards at CSLA Congress '83 in Edmonton.

Following the 1983 Awards, the decision was made to have a national awards program which would evaluate submissions for "Regional" merit and secondly for "National" merit. At the 1985 Board of Governors meeting in Saskatoon, approval was granted, formally incorporating all regional awards programs into one national CSLA program. It was jointly agreed "to participate in one awards program to gain greater national exposure for all participants."

From 1984 to 1986, Arnis Budrevics, OALA, served as Awards Chair. At the Board of Governors meeting held on March 19, 1986 in Halifax, he presented a 7-page report which clearly and comprehensively stated all the goals, objectives and operating procedures under which the Awards Committee would operate. The proposal was accepted and the necessary funds were included in CSLA's annual budgets. During the following years, the annual Professional Awards Programs were well organized and operated flawlessly, thanks primarily to the tireless work and dedication of the respective Award Chairs.
